YOUTH SPOTLIGHT

Julia's journey with ITE began with the Youth Ambassadors for Southwest Cultures internship in 2020. Though her in-the-field experiences were unexpectedly cut short due to COVID-19, she said the internship made her fall in love with Tucson.

Julia remained involved with ITE virtually and progressed through other ITE programs, such as the Desert Youth Heritage Project, Wilderness Warriors, and Youth Action Community - eventually meeting in person with her ITE friends.

For Julia, being part of these programs made Tucson feel like home, gave her a group of friends that she continues to stay in contact with, and provided her the opportunity to go camping and explore nature.

She said they also helped improve her communication skills - public speaking, sharing her voice and opinions, and considering multiple points of view.


After meeting a foreign exchange student through Wilderness Warriors and learning from Angel Breault, a former ITE Program Manager who shared his experiences abroad, Julia was inspired to travel. She gained the confidence to spread her wings.

Currently, Julia is completing her final year of high school in France. So far, she says the experience has been humbling. She equated her struggles in adjusting to a new culture and language to the struggles of adjusting to cold temperatures while camping and long, tiring hikes with ITE. Both started off with great difficulty, but in the end, she proved to herself that "...just because it's hard doesn't mean I can't do it."

In the near future, Julia's goals are to graduate and go to college. She would like to study Political Science, Philosophy, and International Relations. Later, she wants to go to Law School and get involved in immigration law.

Developing skills and growing an appreciation for her home in Tucson taught Julia how to appreciate a new place. From a Southwest Cultures Youth Ambassador to a world traveler, Julia has become ambitious and learned to share her story and her voice.

BECAUSE OF YOU



In one year with ITE, over **1,000 youth participants** enhanced their **sense of place** through personal experiences with camouflaged canyon tree frogs, water flowing through the desert, foraging deer, striding water bugs, and so much more!

After being away on their own adventures, **24 young alumni** returned to nature to **experience** joy, community, and friendship with ITE.

Mushroom gathering, sorting and shelving natural history books, sharing thoughts on worthiness, guiding indigenous youth in tribal lifeways, asking and thanking friends & family for donating, and making it possible for students to explore and learn outdoors are all the ways our guests, teachers, and volunteers helped make ITE a top choice for youth in southern AZ. Nearly **200 dedicated donors** including YOU made a generous gift to ITE this past fiscal year.

ITE **won** a **\$2,500 award** for **placing 1st** for a small nonprofit with the most donors who gave in the Arizona Gives Day 2022 campaign.

5 foundations and **businesses** contributed a total of **\$29,600** to advance ITE's youth programs.

6 federal and national groups representing public lands (forests, parks, historic trails) made youth engagement in conservation education and advocacy a significant part of their work, investing \$295,000 in ITE youth programming.

15 teachers from 3 middle schools and 5 high schools brought the outdoors to their
classrooms by participating in ITE's Field Studies
For Schools program and Teachers Gone Wild
About Birds professional development workshop.


